The presence of the Spirit continues in our lives: The same Spirit that descended at the Jordan and the same Spirit that lifted the people up at Pentecost blesses us today. That Spirit gifts us, and our gifts are special and unique. It is our combined gifts that strengthen us and make us whole. We are the hands and the feet, the eyes and the ears, the heart, voice and the soul of Christ. We are the ones that God needs today.



Notes from the Consistory

The first Consistory meeting of 2023 welcomed three newly elected members and one re-elected member to the group. Each member was then given a Consistory Binder of information including the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws, the Personnel Policy, the Safe Conduct Policy, and the most recent membership list.

The committee/team reports were reviewed and there were no questions. All members were encouraged to consider joining one or more committees. The ONA, Personnel, and Youth committees are especially seeking additional members.

The Epiphany Pageant was celebrated and the families who participated in the pageant were thanked. Under Old Business, Kim announced that our Multimedia specialist, Brandon, is now a permanent part-time employee. The Congregational Annual Meeting will be held on March 12. All committee/team reports are due to Rae by February 5 for inclusion in the printed Annual Report.

The first order of New Business was to elected officers for 2023. The following members were nominated and voted in to these positions: Kim Ridenour, President; Carol Mooers, Vice President; Carroll Sager, Secretary; and Lisa Saum, Treasurer.

The Personnel Committee will refine the job descriptions for these positions and present recommendations next month to the Consistory.

The annual cost for Live Control has increased by \$2,000. There are some options for saving money against this increase. This will be further researched and a decision will be made on the best option as soon as possible.

Stay Up-to-Date - from the Parish Nurse



The field of medicine, like nearly every other profession, is ever changing. New procedures, medications and treatments seem to be a daily occurrence. Cancer health screenings are no different. New guidelines have been issued for cancer screenings. Remember that these are *guidelines* only; your healthcare provider may determine that you need a different time frame for these life- saving screenings. Early detection of abnormalities often results in a better outcome after treatment.

Cancer screenings are important because they can find cancer in its early stages before it spreads to other areas. In some cases of early detection, treatment can be started before you have any symptoms. Women should complete a monthly self- breast exam; your healthcare provider should perform a clinical breast exam at least every 3 years or more often if abnormalities are noted. Mammograms should begin at age 40 for women with no unusual symptoms and continue yearly. Colon cancer has been in the spotlight lately because of several celebrity deaths from this disease. Experts now suggest that screening for colon cancer should start at age 45 (instead of 50). Thankfully, new methods of testing have been developed that can replace a colonoscopy for some people. Cologuard can be completed at home; a negative result means that your next screening can be in 3 years, barring no symptoms develop. If you are at increased risk for developing colon cancer (you have Crohn's disease, ulcerative colitis or a family history of polyps and/or colorectal cancer) colonoscopy is still the best test and its frequency will be determined by your healthcare provider. Screening for cervical cancer (Pap smear) should begin for women at age 21. This test needs repeated every 3 years until age 29 unless abnormalities are found. At age 30, screening should be every 3 years and an HPV (Human Papillomavirus) test completed every 5 years or testing with a Pap smear AND HPV test every 5 years. These guidelines are for women who have not had their cervix removed and have not had any previous abnormalities. Cervical cancer screenings can usually be discontinued at age 65 if previous tests were normal.

A relatively new screening is low-dose computed tomography (LDCT) for smokers ages 50 – 80 with a 20 -pack year history of smoking. (This is a lighter smoking history than previous guidelines.) A pack year is determined by multiplying the number of cigarette packs smoked per day by the number of years you have smoked. This screening check for lung cancer should be completed yearly from age 50 until age 81 and can be stopped if it has been 15 years since you quit smoking.

Most health insurances cover cancer screenings and there are several programs that can lend financial assistance for these tests.

Remember that early detection is key to a good outcome. Stay up to date with your screenings not only for yourself, but especially for those you love!
