And, with broken hearts we traveled with a group of women to discover an empty tomb and full hearts. The story is complete, we think... so now what do we do?



Notes from the Consistory

As we welcomed spring and warmer weather, the Consistory noted that our attendance numbers and our offering numbers are increasing.

The Wednesday evening Lenten Services have been well received. It was decided to continue these service beginning the week of April 16. The ONA committee hopes to schedule a vote on becoming ONA in the near future. The Welcome Statement is still in draft form.

Holly Bell has been offered the Sound/Livestream position. Welcome Holly to a new role at ZION!

ZION has applied for several additional community grants. Most of these grants will address the renovation of the Fellowship Hall, including installing A/C, and will contribute to the purchasing of food for the Soup Kitchen and the Food Pantry. We were notified that we did not receive the March United Way Emergency grant since we received it in January. At this time the remaining grant applications are still pending.

The United Way held a meeting of community resource programs which Kim and Katie attended. A community resource fair is in the works for this fall to be held at ZION. Volunteers to help with the set up/tear down process and to guide guests to the appropriate areas will be needed. More information will follow as details are finalized.

The Catoctin Association Spring Meeting will be held on April 22 at St. John's UCC in Clear Spring. It will be a hybrid meeting. Calvin and Jean plan to attend this meeting along with Katie. Please contact Katie if you are interested in attending.

May 16 - from the Parish Nurse

It seems that there is a National Day for everything and then some! I wanted to see what celebration days were suggested for May, so I looked up National Days for the Year. Each month has a list of what to celebrate on what day; I added all of them up for the year and the total was 8,016 celebration days!!??. Math was never my best subject, but I think that means there are *multiple* things you can celebrate every day. Some of the celebration ideas seem just plain ridiculous....Hairball Awareness Day; Blah, Blah, Blah Day; Spinach Day; Be Nasty Day; and Panic Day. What is so special about these subjects that they need a national day of celebration? There were also some, in my opinion, good suggestions: Plant a Flower Day; Help a Horse Day; Nurses' Day; Chocolate Day; and Do Something Good for Your Neighbor Day.



May is a month about creation, fresh starts and new beginnings. Our area is in a time of transition during May. We are moving from winter cold and frost (our last day for frost is in May around Mothers' Day) into summer warmth and growing. We are moving from darkness into more light. We are moving from brown and dead appearing plants to colorful flowers and refreshing green vegetation. In May we plant vegetables, trees, and flowers. We mow lawns and create beautiful outdoor spaces. Our world appears so alive we feel the need to celebrate!

May 16th is National Do Something Good for Your Neighbor Day. What a worthwhile day to celebrate! There are about as many ways to participate as there are celebration days (8,016) in one year. Help someone with their grocery shopping. Offer your services to a community project or start a new project. Mow an elderly neighbor's grass or clean up their yard debris. Take a meal to someone who is struggling. Donate food or money to a food pantry. Cook or serve food in a soup kitchen. Drive a shut-in to church. Maybe all you have to do is be there for your neighbor to talk to and call on if help is needed. Helping others is a great way to elevate your own mood and your sense of well-being. Just a little bit of your time and caring can mean a world of hope for your neighbor.

A much better way to celebrate National Do Something Good for Your Neighbor Day would be to continue it for a whole year. As Jesus said in Mark, Chapter 12, "Love your neighbor as yourself." Paul wrote to the Thessalonians, instructing them to encourage and build one another up. Hebrews, Chapter 13 reminds us that the Lord is OUR helper; we should help others as he has helped us. During this beautiful month of May, remember those around us who are struggling or are less fortunate. Use your own skills and resources to help a neighbor in need. Be the new beginning or fresh start that one of your neighbors is looking for. What will you do this May 16th? I hope whatever you choose will be the beginning of a year's worth of doing good!


Puzzle!
