Pastor's Pen

Dear Zion Church,

I write you on October 17, 2023. The air is cool and sky overcast, pumpkins abound and we eagerly await the Mummer's Parade. Tomorrow, October 18, we will have a ONA (open and affirming) time to discuss what voting means. On Sunday, during a congregational meeting we will vote.

When you receive this, we will know how the vote went. Either way, it is very clear that Zion hopes to grow in the future and to grow we need to explore becoming the most welcoming place possible. If we think welcome starts at Zion's front door, we need to think again. To radically welcome, we need to get to know the wider community -- especially the people who are just beyond our doors who wouldn't dare come inside.

Radical welcome requires deep listening to The Other. The hallmark of radical welcome is mutuality, which means sharing and listening equally. And to become radically welcome, we'll have to deal with power: who has it, who doesn't, whose culture shapes the church's story and history, whose culture doesn't. Once we listen and know who has the power, we start the important work of identifying ways to embrace each other.

Consistory Highlights

As Zion falls back into a regular routine, there is much to celebrate and to participate in. Our financial income is showing some improvement as our attendance continues to grow. There is also an uptick in the number of people coming to the Tuesday Night Ministries.

Pastor Scott has been meeting with parishioners and local community members. He has even met with the mayor of Hagerstown. Pastor Scott is also working on a presentation for the fall Catoctin Conference meeting. He will complete his UCC accreditation over a 3-year period.

Confirmation classes began October 15 with Pastor Scott leading this group and Tina Shafer assisting. Each confirmand will have a mentor from the Congregation. The Confirmation class will cover the acolyte duties. The Children's Church "bags" will be further differentiated by ages.

The Properties Committee is very busy improving the exterior appearance of Zion as well as updating the interior of the church. Check out the new "wall" being built in the memorial Garden and the pruned trees in the cemetery. A new sidewalk will be installed as part of a multi-phase project to install an ADA compliant doorway to the main floor of the church. New low plantings in front of the church will help to eliminate the museum look of our building. Lighting options are being evaluated for the Fellowship Hall. Volunteers always are welcome to help with these projects. The status of the repair/replacement of the organ sound board is still in limbo awaiting a quote.

Pastor Scott proposed that we have communion on the 1st Sunday of each month. He will consecrate the elements every additional Sunday of the month and have the elements placed in Narthex. Those wishing to commune weekly can access the elements at the conclusion of the service. The votive prayer candles also will be moved to the Narthex. It is hoped that these plans will accommodate everyone's needs.

Two greeters are needed each Sunday morning, one for the middle door and one at the front door. Greeters will welcome visitors and encourage them to sign the guestbook. The red carnations will be reinstated as a way of knowing who is a visitor.

Stewardship Sunday is November 12. Consistory members will be contacting members to share an update of all that is happening at Zion. Car stickers or car magnets and long and short sleeved shirts sporting the Zion UCC design are being considered.

A plaque honoring Scherry Sellers and her work for the Micah's Backpack program will be placed by the door to the Micah's Backpack room. More information about the presentation date to follow.

While no one is finishing their term on Consistory at the end of 2023, there are two vacancies that can be filled. Interested people should contact a Consistory member. Names of anyone interested will be published 3 weeks prior to the December 10th Congregational Meeting at which time a vote will be taken on the nominees and the 2024 budget.

An informal meeting opportunity with Pastor Scott will be held on Wednesday, October 25 as part of a Potluck dinner and the decorating of the classroom doors for Halloween.

If you have noticed the microphones cutting out periodically during the worship service, the issue apparently is caused by a television/radio waves moving through our building. No kidding! We will be extending our antenna to eliminate this interference.

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
